


State-level estimates from the NHIS

- 20 largest states in terms of overall population in June Early Release report (annual estimates)
- 41 states on state and regional insurance report (3 year estimates)

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Health Insurance Coverage Trends, 1959–2007: Estimates from the National Health Interview Survey

Objectives—This report presents long-term trends in the number and percentage of persons under age 65 years with different types of health insurance **Abstract** coverage and with no coverage. It documents changes in how the National Health Interview Survey (NHIS) has collected information about coverage over almost 50 years. It also compares recent trends in coverage estimates based on the NHIS and the U.S. Census Bureau's Current Population Survey (CPS). Methods—Estimates were derived from 32 years of the NHIS, from 1959 to


2007. The types of estimates available differ over these years, reflecting changes in the availability of different types of coverage and changes in the NHIS questions. Joinpoint regression was used to estimate average annual percent change over time and to identify statistically significant changes in trends.

Results—The percentage of persons under age 65 years with private between 1959 and 1968, to 79%, remained stable until 1980 and

requires accurate and timely information on the number of persons who lack health insurance coverage and on the number with different types of coverage.


The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) updates estimates of the uninsured and those with private and public coverage quarterly, based on data from the National Health Interview Survey (NHIS). These quarterly reports present annual trends in health insurance coverage starting with 1997 and include






Type of coverage among near poor children under age 18: United States, 1997- March 2009



Type of coverage among near poor adults 18-64 years of age: United States, 1997- March 2009




Percent of adults with unmet medical needs due to cost by type of coverage and year


Percent of adults 18-64 with private health insurance who had unmet medical needs due to cost by type of private health insurance
